If your circle is colored, then the event is geared towards your age boys.

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BLACKHAWK HONOR TRAIL

The Glacier's Edge Council offers a unique program with its Summer Camp experience incorporating traditions and lore of the Woodland Indian.

This recognition is highly prized and its spirit surrounds our camp and traditions. The Blackhawk Camp Honor is not a required program. It is offered as part of the overall Summer Camp program to be completed by the Scout if he so desires. The requirements have been structured to appeal to Scouts strictly on their own merits.

The totems are achieved by attending the different Cub Scout programs and their ceremonies.

Scouts attending the CIT Day Camp Overnight can complete this level. – this is represented on the tent pebble.

OWL



Scouts attending Cub Scout Resident Camp sessions can complete this level. – this is represented on the Cub Tent pebble.

FOX



Scouts attending any Webelos Resident Camp can complete this level. – this is represented on the Webelos Tent pebble.

BEAR



Scouts attending any Webelos Long Term held at EBSR can complete this level. – this is represented on the Arrow of Light/Order of the Arrow pebble.

Honor pebbles are award at the corresponding ceremony and program emblems are available for purchase in the camp trading post. Additional pebbles are available for Tiger Trax, Webelos Shooting Sports, Winter Day Camp and other exciting programs.

CUB TRAINING

BALOO - BASIC ADULT LEADER OUTDOOR ORIENTATION

This is an 8-hour outdoor training course for all Cub Scout Leaders. This course is required for all Cub Leaders that want to engage in outdoor activities. Participants acquire the skills and confidence necessary to plan and carry out a successful Cub Scout level overnight activity and understand the focus of the Cub Scout level of the BSA.

At least one member of the Pack must be BALOO trained prior to a Pack overnight outing and is identified on the Tour Plan.

OWL - OUTDOOR WEBELOS LEADER TRAINING

This fun-filled weekend training course is for all Bear and Webelos Leaders and those involved in delivering the Webelos program. Learn the skills necessary to successfully implement the Webelos outdoor program. Incorporating the adage “3/4 of Scouting is Outing”, the course is conducted out-of-doors, rain or shine. Outdoor skills of Cooking and Sanitation, Campfires, Knots, Woods Tools, Naturalist, Forester, First Aid, Fire Building, Geologist, Outdoorsman, Selecting Campsites, Tents, Bedding and Weather are taught in the program. The emphasis is Hands-on Training. It also prepares the leader to conduct Webelos overnight camping with the boys and parents of the den.

ALL SCOUTER POW-WOW

The All Scouter Pow Wow is supplemental leader training at its BEST. It is designed to provide program ideas, resources and FUN for all Scouting volunteers. It is planned so that leaders may return year after year, earn certifications as appropriate and keep current on all that Scouting has to offer the youth of our area.

We have arranged the classes in interest areas that we call “tracks”. A track is a guideline so that you can take all of the classes in that interest area all day if you choose. Tracks are just a planning device so that classes in the same interest area are not held at the same time. You can mix and match classes from any number of tracks.

WOOD BADGE

Wood Badge is an advanced adult leadership training program for all leaders in Cub Scout, Boy Scout, and Venturing programs. Over six days, Scouters participate in intensive training and use the patrol model. Once this portion is complete, the practical portion begins: completing the Wood Badge ticket. Over a period up to eighteen months, participants complete various projects in service to others, service to the troop, and personal growth. Leaders desiring a deeper dedicated involvement in the Scouting program will find this advanced training highly rewarding.

At Cub Scout Resident Camps, Webelos Resident Camp, and Mom & Me Camp will include all meals for the duration of your stay. These camps start with dinner on the first day.

At Mom & Me Camp and Cub Scout Resident Camp end with lunch on the last day of the session, while Webelos Resident Camp ends with breakfast on Day 4.

**Should you need to bring your own food due to food allergies or religious restrictions, please bring a labeled cooler with your name and Pack to check in so it can be safely kept until mealtime.

At the conclusion of each session, campers will receive a list of requirements they may have met over the course of their time at camp. PRE-CAMP ADULT ORIENTATION AND TRAINING MEETING

It is required that at least two leaders from each Pack attending regional camp programs attends this meeting to learn the most up to date information as well as to turn in all Health Forms, Prescription Medication Forms, and pay any last minute registrations.

Packs are also asked to provide a leader to function as a Range Safety Officer. These meetings also function as the training session for all volunteer staff, where unit Range Safety Officers will be trained.

CAMP STAFF

The Camp Staff for all of the regional camp programs are volunteer positions. The Regional Camp Director is National Camp School trained and certified, who then helps the training of the remaining Staff. Packs attending these camps have an obligation to help in providing a minimum of two Staff members for the duration of their stay. These individuals will be provided with a syllabus, materials and hands-on practice time for the stations they will be running and are required to attend an Adult Orientation and Training Meeting.

Some paid positions are available for those individuals available to work over the course of all of the regional camp programs. These positions include a Regional Camp Director, Regional Program Director, and a Quarter-master. Please contact the Council Camping Executive for information on these positions.

GENERAL INFORMATION

CAMP SET-UP AND TAKE DOWN

Packs attending any of the regional camp programs are expected to assist with camp set-up and take down. Times and dates will be given out at the Adult Orientation and Training Meetings.

CHECK-IN/CHECK-OUT PROCEDURE

All regional camp program check-ins will be held at a specified location at each camp.

Packs should assemble near the specified location and the Pack Coordinator should bring a copy of that day's roster to the location for attendance. In addition to the roster on day one, the Pack Coordinator should ensure all Health Forms and Prescription Medication Forms have been turned in prior to the start of camp.

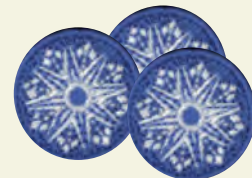

WEBELOS LONG-TERM

This second year Webelos program focuses on the transition to Boy Scouts and the program opportunities ahead. Day one at Webelos Long Term starts with check-in at 1:30 pm. WEBELOS SHOOTING SPORTS CAMPS

Regional Camps Shooting Sports Camps are geared towards boys who will be Webelos II in the fall. Cub Scouts are only allowed to earn their BB-Gun and Archery pins at a certified Cub Scout Camp with nationally trained Range Staff and that is exactly what the Shooting Sports Camp offers. Throughout the program, the boys attending this camp will move between the two ranges as well as participant in a workbook session in order to ensure the maximum amount of training and achievement. At the end of the day, boys will be awarded the pin(s) they have earned.

RANGE OFFICERS

In order to run the Shooting Sports Ranges, a minimum of one certified Range Officer per every eight boys is required. Volunteers for Range Officers will be given an opportunity to go through a training session on range safety. The volunteers for Range Safety Officer will be given multiple opportunities to go through the 2.5-hour training session on range safety and must demonstrate competency in the instruction and management of the boys on the range. Each Pack attending these camps should provide one or more volunteers to serve as Range Officers over the course of the Shooting Sports Camps. These adults will be trained at the Adult Orientation & Training Meeting.

CAMP FEES

We encourage all camp fees be submitted through your Pack. Each Pack should strive to submit one check for every camp session that they are attending. If you are not attending camp with your Pack, please submit your forms and fees to the Glacier's Edge Scout Service Center. In order to receive the early pay discount, the camp fee must be paid in full by May 1st.

Camp fees include the following:

- Program materials for each Cub Scout
- Lunch for all Day Camps at Camp Indian Trails (CIT), as well as all other meals for Cub Scout Resident Camp, Webelos Resident Camp, Mom & Me, Dad & Lad, and Tiger Trax.
- Meals are not provided at the Regional Day Camp (RDC), Shooting Sports Camps sessions and RDC Tiger Trax session.
- Camp patch for all programs
- Annual camp T-shirts will be included for youth at CIT Day Camps, Regional Day Camps, CIT Resident Camp, Webelos Resident Camp and Webelos Long Term.
- Youth at Mom & Me, Dad & Lad, Tiger Trax, Shooting Sports Camps, and Webelos Expedition may purchase the annual shirt during registration
- Leaders may purchase the annual shirt during registration

REFUNDS

Refunds will only be made if requested in WRITING prior to June 1st. Requests must be made by the Pack Coordinator and should be directed to the Glacier's Edge Council Camping Executive, Nick Rose at the Madison Council Service Center. Packs may choose to credit program fees to new camper replacement registrations. Transfer requests must be submitted to the Council Program Specialist, Callie Fritchen for consideration.

Approved refunds will be credited to the Pack account with a 25% per scout cancellation fee deducted. Packs may appeal any refund decisions to the Glacier's Edge Camping Committee in WRITING before the start of the registered session.

CAMPERSHIP

Your Cubmaster or Pack Committee Chair should make the request for a Campership with the help of the Scout applying. Applications can be found on the Glacier's Edge Council Camping website or at either Council Service Center and must be completely filled out and returned to the Council Service Center no later than March 1st. Those Scouts joining a unit after March 1st may apply as soon as possible, up until June 1st.

LEADERSHIP

Each Pack must provide at least two adults, one being 21 or older, per Pack at all times. We encourage Packs to maintain one Adult to four Scouts ratio. These leaders are to help with supervision of their Pack and set an example for their Scouts.

If your Pack does not have the adequate volunteers to contribute to both supervise your Scouts and contribute to the program, we suggest that Packs register for one of the day camp sessions at CIT that offer paid staff or attend with another local unit. You may contact any of the Camp Directors for questions, comments or special consideration on this issue.

PACK COORDINATOR

The Pack Coordinator acts as the liaison between the camp and the Pack and is responsible for the following:

- Familiarize themselves with the Cub Scout Catalog
- Promote camp and programs to the Pack
- Ensure Pack camp registration and payment are correctly submitted in a timely manner to the Council Service Center
- Oversee general coordination of the Pack while at camp
- Attend and recruit adults for the Cub Scout Program Orientation & Training

UNIFORM & DRESS CODE

It is encouraged that those who attend Day Camp wear their camp issued t-shirt. Although not required, the Cub Scout Class A uniform is acceptable, especially for daily flag ceremonies at Cub Scout Resident Camp, Webelos Resident Camp, Webelos Long Term, and the Parent & Pal Programs. Scout appropriate clothing, as well as closed toe shoes are required for all camp activities.

LOST & FOUND

The location of lost and found items varies at each camp and will be disclosed to campers on the first day of each session. Any items found at Camp Indian Trails will be retained in the First Aid office. Items found at the Regional Camps will be transported to the Madison Scout Service Center after each session. After September 1st, items will be donated to charity.

TRADING POST

At each camp, there will be a camp store called the Trading Post. In the Trading Post there will be equipment, camp shirts, snacks, and other items. Daily, each Scout will have an opportunity to explore the Trading Post.

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SAFETY

SECURITY

Pack Coordinators are responsible for taking attendance at the beginning and conclusion of each day of camp. This roster should be returned to the Camp Registrar after morning check-in and afternoon check-out. Visitors, or anyone having to leave camp for any reason during the day, must check in and out at the Camp Office. Scouts who are leaving early from camp or those who will be picked up from someone other than who dropped him off must have a completed Scout Release Form turned in. No exceptions will be made.

WRISTBANDS

A wristband will be issued to each camp participant upon check-in and must be worn at all times. If you notice anyone in camp who is not wearing a wristband, you should report them to a Staff Member as soon as possible.

LEAVING CAMP

Scouts who need to leave camp property during camp hours must submit a completed Scout Release Form to the Camp Office. Scouts and adults leaving camp are required to sign in and out at the Camp Office upon returning.

TRAVEL BETWEEN STATIONS

Pack leaders and other adults are requested to assist in ensuring safe travel between program areas. There is travel time allotted between program areas and it is imperative that each session stays on schedule.

SIBLING/WALK-ALONG POLICY

It is preferred that siblings not attend camp. In the event that a sibling must attend, please remember that the program focus is on our registered Cub participants. Parents are asked to supervise and accompany siblings at all times. Siblings must also comply with all general policies, including Health Form requirements.

BUDDY SYSTEM

The buddy system is to be used at all times while on camp property. Please review the buddy system guidelines with your Pack before attending camp.

PETS

With the exception of service animals, NO pets are allowed at camp.

BICYCLES

Bicycles are not permitted while camp is in session. If your Pack would like to organize a bike ride to get to camp, bikes will be permitted, but not allowed to be in operation during the hours in which camp is open.

ELECTRONICS & PHONES

We strongly discourage boys from bringing radios, cell phones, video games, and other such devices to camp. All adults are asked to turn phones to silent mode and enjoy the time with your child. If you absolutely must take a call please step away from the program area, as to not cause distraction or a safety concern.

WEATHER & EMERGENCIES

Scouts should be prepared to participate in camp activities rain or shine. 'Rainy Day' activities will be planned in the event of thunder, lightning, or severe weather. Emergency procedures will be posted throughout camp and will be reviewed with all participants at the start of each camp session.

In the event of severe weather, a day of camp may be cancelled prior to beginning. Due to the nature of Regional Day Camps, there will be no make up day for cancelled days due to weather.

SHOOTING SPORTS POLICY

Youth who wish to participate in any Glacier's Edge Council BB-Gun or Archery activity must either be a Tiger Cub or sibling/walk-a-long and be at least six years of age. Range masters have the authority to limit participation of any shooting sports activity in order to ensure the maximum amount of safety is maintained. The ranges are outfitted with equipment approved and maintained by the Council Shooting Sports Committee. No personal firearms or bows will be permitted.

FIREWORKS & EXPLOSIVES

Fireworks, firearms, and explosives are not allowed on camp property. This includes any personal guns, archery equipment, or slingshots. Although we recognize the Second Amendment, concealed carry is prohibited on Glacier's Edge Council camps and property and we ask that all guns and ammo be left at home.



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HEALTH

HEALTH FORMS & MEDICATION

Each person attending camp is required to have a completed Boy Scouts of America Health Form. This form needs to have the signature of the licensed health-care practitioner within the last 12 months and updated by parents annually. Immunization dates and medications must be listed on the health form in the appropriate area. Medications should be turned in upon check-in on your first day of camp as well as notification of any severe allergies. A camper may keep certain prescription medications, such as bee sting kits and inhalers on their person. Campers on prescription medication must complete the Prescription Medication Form. All forms are available on the council camping website.

Please inform the Council Program Specialist two weeks in advance of any special dietary needs due to medical or religious reasons. We will always do our best to provide a comparable substitute. Special food needs and allergy concerns (for campers or guests) must be requested at least two weeks prior to arrival in camp.

PLEASE TURN IN ALL RDC SESSION FORMS AT THE TIME OF REGISTRATION.

ILLNESS

When a Scout or Scouter's health is in question prior to camp, it is better for that Scout or Scouter to delay their trip to camp. If any camper becomes ill during camp, it must be reported to the Health Officer. If a Scout becomes too ill to participate in the program, his parents will be contacted regarding transportation home.

FOOD STORAGE & SAFETY

A unit may bring its own special condiments or food to camp. The commissary will freeze ice for units in unit provided ice containers. Be sure all containers are marked with the unit's number.

Units should not keep perishable foods in the campsite. There will be no discounts given on any camping fees if a unit brings their own food. This policy is the same for those who go "off reservation" for any meals.

Remember, food wastes attract unwanted guests, such as skunks and raccoons. Garbage is picked up each evening on the service road. Be sure your garbage bags are tightly closed and tied.

SMOKING POLICY

The Boy Scouts of America and the Glacier's Edge Council have adopted a SMOKE FREE POLICY. As a leader, you are to set an example for your Scouts and smoking will not be permitted in camp.

ALCOHOL & CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES

The Boy Scouts of America and the Glacier's Edge Council observe a ZERO TOLERANCE policy. Alcohol, marijuana and controlled substances will NOT BE TOLERATED while at camp. Violation will result in expulsion. Any persons found under the influence or in possession of the previously stated items will be asked to leave camp.

- Apply for needed camperships to Madison Service Center Program Office

Before March 15th

- Select summer camp sessions with Pack Committee and Parents
- Address adult leadership and volunteer staffing needs
- Obtain medical forms from either Scout Service Center or online at:

Before April 1st

- Ensure all Scouts have completed registration
- Select adults to attend Pre-Camp Adult Orientation and Training Meeting

- Compile missing medical forms from parents, leaders and Scouts
- Arrange transportation needs
- Hold Pack Leader and Parents meeting
- Finalize program and leadership
- Submit final refund requests
- Sign-up deadline for any newly registered youth camperships
